Grant: School Violence Prevention Program (SVPP)

Funder: Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS), USDOT

Eligibility: Local law enforcement, State law enforcement, Units of local government (e.g., counties, cities, school districts), Federally recognized Indian tribes and their public agencies, public government agencies

Award: 36 months; \$500,000 (235 awards anticipated). 25% cash match required.

SVPP funding will provide up to 75% funding for the following school safety measures in and around K-12 (primary and secondary) schools and school grounds:

- **“Coordination with law enforcement”**
- “Training for local law enforcement officers to prevent student violence against others and self”
- “Metal detectors, locks, lighting, and other deterrent measures”
- **“Technology for expedited notification of local law enforcement during an emergency”**
- “Any other measure that the COPS Office determines may provide a significant improvement in security”

Funds will support target hardening equipment to secure schools such as cameras, security systems, fencing, locks, drug- or firearm-detecting dogs, and more.

Note: The following school safety measures are available through the Bureau of Justice Assistance’s (BJA’s) section of the STOP School Violence Act of 2018 (see that grant opportunity) and are not permitted for the SVPP grant:

- Development and operation of anonymous reporting systems
 - Hotlines
 - Internet websites
 - Mobile telephone applications
- Development and operation of a school threat assessment
- Specialized training for school officials in responding to mental health crises
- Training for school personnel and students to prevent student violence against others and self
- Any other measure the BJA determines may provide a significant improvement in security
